# USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service Accepting 2019 EQIP Applications

Farmers and landowners in Arkansas have until Nov. 2, 2018, to submit applications to receive financial assistance to implement conservation activities through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) for the 2018 program year. Applicants can sign up at their local USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service field service center.

A Nov. 2, 2018, deadline is set for:

- Conservation Activity Plans
- High Tunnel Systems
- National Organic Initiative
- National On-Farm Energy Initiative

Individuals and other entities actively engaged in agricultural production are eligible to participate in EQIP. EQIP offers a continuous application sign-up. However, to be considered for funding under the 1st batch period, sign-up applications must be received by Nov. 2. An application deadline for other EQIP initiatives, will be announced soon.

All applications will be evaluated for funding based on a state and nationally developed procedure to optimize environmental benefits. Applications ranking highest in a funding category will be funded according to priority and is subject to availability of program funds.

# Savory Recipe of the Quarter <u>Sweet-Potato and Sausage</u> <u>Hash</u>

2 large sweet potatoes (about 2 pounds) \*, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch pieces 1/2-pound bulk pork sausage 2 tablespoons vegetable oil 2 bell peppers (any color), chopped 1 onion, chopped 2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced 2 teaspoons ground cumin Salt and pepper Green salsa, for serving

In a medium pot of boiling, salted water, cook the sweet potatoes until almost tender, about 4 minutes. Drain and set aside.

In a large nonstick skillet, cook the sausage over medium heat until browned and crumbly, about 10 minutes; transfer with a slotted spoon to paper towels to drain.

Heat the oil in the skillet over medium-high heat. Add the bell peppers, onion and garlic and cook until softened, about 5 minutes.

Add the sausage, cumin and sweet potatoes and cook for 5 minutes more. Season to taste with salt and pepper and serve with green salsa Yield: 4 servings. \* Sweet Potatoes are in season so try to get them at your local farmers market

# Sweet Recipe of the Quarter **Pecan Squares**

From AACDE Cookbook

2 c. all-purpose flour ½ c. powdered sugar 1 c. butter, cut up 1 (14-oz.) can sweetened condensed milk 1 large egg 1 tsp. vanilla extract 1 package almond brickle chips\* 1 c. chopped pecans\*

Combine flour and powdered sugar in a medium bowl. Cut in butter with a pastry blender until crumbly.

Press mixture evenly into a greased 9 X 13-in pan. Bake at 350° for 15 minutes.

Combine sweetened condensed milk and next 4 ingredients: pour over prepared crust. Bakes at 350° for 25 minutes or until golden. Cool and cut into squares.

Yield: 4 dozen. \*We used Bits' O Brickle found in the baking section of your supermarket. \* You can get your pecans from us! We are taking orders until October 26!

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
